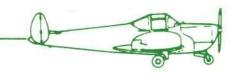

Bob Conlon finished my RST 442 Intercom kit - - it works fine, I certainly enjoy being able to slide the canopy down and still talk with ease to my co-pilot. I'll be glad to furnish details for anyone requesting them and will have the unit with me at our next fly-in.

Incidentally, if anyone needs a mike, I have found the best price to be RST. The Telex 66C (carbon) is listed for \$30 and the Telex 66T (transistorized dynamic) is \$39.75. (For catalog, write, Radio Systems Technology, Inc., 10985 Grass Valley Avenue, Grass Valley, CA 95945).

I have gathered all the information I can get my hands on regarding the use of MOGAS in aircraft. Quite a bit is from the past six or seven issues of EAA's Sport Aviation regarding Tests on their Cessna 150 with it 0-200 engine.

I just received the June 1, 1982 issue of The Aviation Consumer which has about 8 pages devoted to the latest available information on the tests, uses, regulations, and limitations of MOGAS. If you think this can be of interest to you let me know and I can include the information in future mailings of our newsletter.

With the cost of AVGAS going into orbit and the general unavailability of 80/87 for our ancient continental engines, I feel that this research might bear watching.

I hope the FAA will soon clear the use of readily available MOGAS for the 150, our coupes, and other aircraft requiring less than 100 octane fuel.

The other short article from aviation consumer is from the distant past- - but again, it's interesting and should provide food for thought. Our "coupes" are great - - but they still must be flown with a degree of caution and respect.

On landing the aircraft was landed on its nose wheel which collapsed and the aircraft went over on its back causing substantial damage and minor injuries to the pilot. The Tulsa GADO is investigating.

WHERE DOES THE MONEY GO????

Quite often I am asked what happens to the money that comes into the club. This is a reasonable and logical question and one that certainly needs to be answered. To begin with let's look at our printing and mailing costs. To print and mail an issue of the newsletter runs about \$500.00 per issue, which includes printing, postage, mailing labels, and computer usage. Based on a membership of approximately 900 me bers, we have a cost of \$6.68 per member per year. Office rental telephone, miscellaneous printing, miscellaneous postage, accounting fees, \$3.00 per person per year. Trophys awarded, product testing, gas, insurance, photo expense, local and regional newsletter expense, dues and memberships in other organizations. National Fly-In expense and travel expense (reimbursement to officers and directors for club travel) \$5.32 per member, or a total of \$15.00. Other things of interest: None of the officers, directors or the Executive Director receive any compensation or salary for services performed. The Computer was purchased by Carden Printing Co. on a 3 year lease. The Ercoupe Owners Club pays 1/3 of the monthly rental on this machine although the lions share of the usage is theirs. In three years this monthly charge will be eliminated. The office rent is charged at \$35.00 per month for a 10x12 office space in our building. The services of a part time secretary and computer operator are not charged to the Club.

I hope that the above will clear up any questions that you had regarding what happens to your \$15,00 fee. If you have any other questions please feel free to contact me for answers.

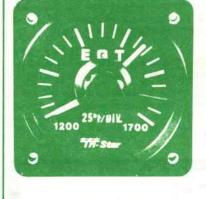

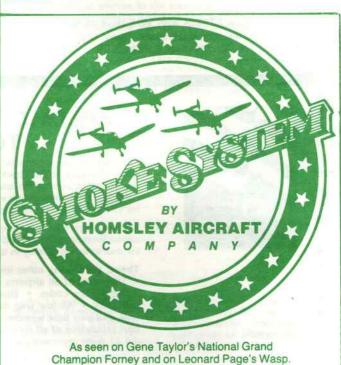

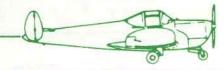
